

"Judge Not, That Ye Be Not Judged"

Matthew 7:1-5

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INTRODUCTION

- The statement "Judge not, that ye be not judged" (Matt. 7:1) is famous but often misunderstood
- Jesus, in Matthew 7:1-5, provides instructions on the right and wrong way to correct others

MISINTERPRETATION: ALL JUDGING PROHIBITED

- "Judge not" does not mean we should completely ignore the sins of others -v. 5
- Krino ("judge"): properly, to separate; i.e. judge; come to a choice by making a judgment either positive or negative HELPS Word-studies
- Certain judging is allowed, even commanded -Matt. 18:15-17; Luke 17:3; John 7:24; 1 Cor. 5:3
- Matthew 7:1-5 forbids hypercritical and hypocritical judging

HYPERCRITICAL JUDGING PROHIBITED (vv. 1-2)

- God will judge us the way we judge others, and we need His mercy -Matt. 18:32-35
- The proper attitude: mercy and fairness -Luke 6:36-37; John 7:24
- The proper motive: to save people -Jas. 5:19-20; 4:12
- The proper approach: gentleness -Gal. 6:1

HYPOCRITICAL JUDGING CORRECTED (vv. 3-5)

- Do not correct someone of some small flaw ("speck") if you have a greater sin ("log") in your own life
- First, eliminate your own sin -v. 5
 - Only possible if you first notice your own sin -v. 3b
- Do not live by a double standard -Matt. 23:1-4; Rom. 2:1-3

CONCLUSION

You can "judge" others as long as you do it in the correct manner, with fairness and sincerity
